Sid Motion Gallery is pleased to present 'Internal Weather', the gallery's 50th exhibition and the first in a newly expanded space. In this moment of expansion, the gallery takes the opportunity to include new voices and disciplines with a group show of 7 artists, 5 of whom have not shown with the gallery before.

The artists in this exhibition have been selected for their exploration of themes of identity, self consciousness, gaze, sexuality and binary definitions of gender. Such timely and important themes has allowed the gallery to group together artists that investigate their interest in these areas in many different ways.

The exhibition title is borrowed from the series of jesmonite wall based sculptures by Tom Woolner included in the exhibition. Much like the exhibition, the series is an investigation of self and identity.

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Laurie Cole (b. 1994, Cornwall) studied at Falmouth University and graduated from Kingston University in 2016. Her recent exhibitions include: 'Across the River', New Grass Gallery, London, 2021; 'Four Paddles' (solo), Wardrobe Theatre, Bristol, 2019; 'Radiant', and 'LETH (curated by Samuel Bassett)', That Art Gallery, Bristol, 2018 and 2017; 'Make Shift', Centrespace Gallery, Bristol, 2018; 'Flying Figures', Tobacco Factory, Bristol, 2018; 'TAKE', (Artist Residency and group exhibition) The Vestibules, Bristol, 2018; and 'I, the Poet. You, the Poet.', SPACE, Bristol, 2017. In 2019, Cole completed an Artist Residency at Studio Garonne, Saint-Martory, France. She lives and works in South London.

Grace Mattingly (b. 1991) graduated from Columbia University and recently completed her MA at The Slade School of Fine Art. She is a London-based figurative painter whose sensual works use fluid colour and playfully fantastical imagery to explore feminist mythologies of her imagination. Mattingly has previously exhibited at Prior Art Space, Berlin; Arusha Gallery in Scotland; Big Pictures, Los Angeles, amongst others. Mattingly has upcoming exhibitions at Taymour Grahne Projects and Sid Motion Gallery in London, is a recipient of the Elizabeth Greenshields grant and and has been featured in publications such as Art Maze Mag.



Graham Martin (b. 1983, Ayr, Scotland) graduated from the Royal College of Art with an MA in Painting (2021) following studies at Université Paris II Panthéon-Assas (2009-2010), Edinburgh University (2003-2007), and Edinburgh College of Art (2001-2003). Martin's group shows include 'London Grads Now', Saatchi Gallery, London, 2021-2022; 'Tomorrow 2021', White Cube, London, 2021; 'Burra & Friends', Rye Art Gallery, Rye, 2021; 'The Weird and the Eerie', Hockney Gallery, London, 2020; 'RBA Rising Stars', Royal Over-Seas League, London, 2019; The John Moores Painting Prize, Walker Museum, Liverpool, 2018; The John Ruskin Prize, New Art Gallery, Walsall, 2016; and the Columbia Threadneedle Prize, Mall Galleries, London and Palazzo Strozzi, Florence, 2016. He is a recent recipient of the Huxley-Parlour FOUR x THREE grant (2022), the Jerwood Arts 1:1 FUND grant (2021) and the Elizabeth Greenshields Foundation Grant (2020) and will have his first solo show at Huxley-Parlour Gallery in London in 2022. In 2021, he and his partner Carlos Silveria launched Trafalgar Avenue, an artist-led gallery and project space in South East London.

Pat O'Connor graduated from Royal College of Art London in 1996. Laurence Owen (b. 1984, Gloucester) graduated from Stroud College of Art, 2002; Falmouth College of Art, Fine Art Painting, BA (Hons), in 2005 and from the Postgraduate Diploma in Fine Art at Royal Academy Schools in 2015.
